

Your Impact for Wildlife Across the Regions



California

- Advanced the Wallis Annenberg Wildlife Crossing in Los Angeles, which will provide safe passage for imperiled mountain lions and other wildlife over one of the busiest freeways in the country. Expected to be complete by the end of 2025.
- Identified over a dozen priority locations for wildlife crossings and connectivity improvements in Southern California.



South Central

- Planted 50,000 longleaf pine seedlings and 50,000 wiregrass and little bluestem seedlings in Hoke Community Forest.
- Began construction on the Everglades Agricultural Area Reservoir. Water is flowing through the project's stormwater treatment area for the first time.
- Broke ground on the Mid-Barataria Sediment Diversion — the largest coastal restoration project in the country — that will reconnect the Mississippi River to nearby wetlands.



Mid-Atlantic

- Created, restored, and enhanced green spaces in urban centers.
- Worked with coastal communities to install living shorelines and other nature-based features to address issues related to sea level rise and flooding, storm surge, erosion, and habitat loss.
- Increased pollinator habitat and use of stormwater best management practices.



Northern Rockies, Prairies & Pacific

- Continued working to bring beavers back to the landscape to replenish groundwater and stream flows to sustain year-round habitat for fish and wildlife, as well as downstream water users.
- Modified fencing to allow wildlife to safely pass through fences while keeping livestock safe.
- Reduced wildlife-livestock conflict through our Wildlife Conflict Resolution program, which has resulted in recovered grizzly and wolf populations and the protection of dozens of bighorn sheep herds.



Rocky Mountains

- Installed over 20 miles of wildlife-friendly fencing.
- Restored almost five miles of streams in the arid West to help wildlife thrive.
- Worked with ranchers to reduce wolf-livestock conflict to ensure the restoration of wolves in Colorado is successful.



Northeast

- Secured passage of the NY Tropical Deforestation-Free Procurement Act, the strongest tropical hardwoods ban in the country on state and local governments. Once the governor signs the legislation, the bill will help protect the Amazon and other tropical forests that are being destroyed for palm oil, beef, and cocoa.
- Restored and protected critical habitat along the Atlantic Coast, which many of the region's endangered and threatened species depend on. This will also help protect coastal communities from unprecedented flooding.



Great Lakes

- Celebrated a huge victory that greenlit the Brandon Road Lock and Dam infrastructure project, which will protect the region's fisheries.
- Continued working to ensure Enbridge Energy's Line 5 oil pipeline is shut down to protect the Great Lakes and the sovereignty of Tribes impacted by the pipeline.
